ORCC is a charity that brings together people who care about rural life. In all we do, we focus on 'helping people to help themselves'. Over our lifetime, Oxfordshire has changed, yet some problems – housing, transport, availability of services – have never gone away.

There are new challenges too – the ageing population, rising fuel prices, climate change, and increasingly centralised services. And in future, the pool of volunteers – who have always done so much to contribute to village life – may shrink as people work for longer.

... Founded in 1920, we are the oldest RCC in the country.



But Oxfordshire's villages are alive and well, and with ORCC's help, run nearly 300 village halls, around 70 community transport schemes, more community-run shops than any other county, while many are busy with parish plans and small affordable housing schemes for local people. Add to this an endless list of clubs and societies, fetes and events – the perfect recipe for strong, thriving and caring places to live.

Village Halls...

Our Village Halls Adviser helps hall committees with everything from effective marketing ideas to energy saving, from legal requirements to funding opportunities. Regular newsletters, briefings and area meetings help volunteers to keep up to date with everything they need to know about how to manage their halls and meet local needs as well as they possibly can. Our adviser is available to answer individual gueries and will make site visits where necessary.

There are almost 300 village halls in Oxfordshire, all owned and run by local communities.



Village Shops...

The Village Shops Development Worker provides advice and support to rural shopkeepers. This includes advice on business development, regular fact sheets and newsletters, and information about grants to improve shop facilities. Villages that have lost their shop are helped to explore options such as community-run shops, while volunteers already involved in running community shops are provided with regular opportunities to meet up with one another to share their experiences.



Affordable Housing...

The Rural Housing Enablers work with parish councils and other local groups to promote affordable housing schemes in their villages. These are usually small schemes on 'exception sites', where special rules mean that houses will always be given to people with a local connection. We help with local housing needs surveys, finding possible sites for new affordable housing, linking with planning officers and generally 'trouble-shooting' when there are any hold-ups in the process.



Community Led Plans...

In any community, change is inevitable. Community led plans (sometimes called Parish Plans) give local people a way of saying what kind of changes they want for their village and to decide on what is most important to them. ORCC's Community Development Workers help local residents to consult their communities and draw up an action plan. They provide information, community visits and events to help local people develop the skills they need – with a strong emphasis both on including the whole community and on having fun!



SURAL TRANSPORT

Rural Transport...

ORCC has a team of 3 staff working on transport, reflecting the fact that 'getting there' is so important to rural communities.

The Community Transport Advisers help local people to set up and manage community transport schemes with advice on getting started, consulting local people, getting funding and complying with all the legal requirements. A Directory of Community Transport Schemes is published annually (available free of charge from ORCC).

We also help communities to carry out transport needs surveys, which help local authorities and bus operators to better understand what is needed.

Over a year it is estimated that volunteer drivers to be. This is calculated to save over £300,000.

The Disability and Access officer provides accredited 'MIDAS' training to people providing community transport for people with mobility impairments. He also supports 'Transport for All', a group that presses for improvements to disabled access.

The Community Transport and Accessibility officer works closely with local and statutory authorities, bus operators and other groups when plans for rural bus services are being considered. He represents the particular needs of rural communities and works to find creative ways of meeting their needs and influencing the way that transport services are provided.

Market Towns...

Oxfordshire's smaller market towns have been working hard to hold their own against competition from outside – whether supermarkets, internet shopping, or bigger shopping centres. ORCC has worked with several of them to do a 'Market Towns Healthcheck' (a bit like a large scale community led plan) which has helped local 'town partnerships' to work out how to make their towns more attractive to shoppers and visitors. Faringdon, Kidlington, Carterton, Wallingford, Wantage/Grove and Thame have all successfully attracted funds for major projects such as new community buildings, street furniture and signs, town centre wi-fi, and improved landscaping.



Oxfordshire is the most rural county in the South East and almost half its population lives in rural communities. Part of ORCC's job is to make sure that decision-makers at local, regional and national level know about the ways in which policies and services will affect rural people. We do this by working in partnership with local authorities and other public bodies, and by responding to consultations when changes are planned.
